

Big Question: What would it be like to visit Paris?

<p>A Lion in Paris</p> <p>Listen to Miss Pike's reading of "A Lion in Paris"</p>  <p>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=cHi3yNm6pfo&feature=youtu.be</p> <p>Visualisation - Can you use the story and its pictures to create a pictomap of Paris which includes the famous landmarks the lion visited? These include the River Seine, the Louvre Art Gallery, the Sacre Couer, the Eiffel Tower and the Lion of Belfort (where the lion chose to stay on the plinth.)</p>	<p>Famous Landmarks</p> <p>Can you create an informative leaflet for tourists visiting Paris which tells them some interesting facts about the city's famous landmarks. This top 10 video might help but you may need to do some additional research of your own.</p> <p>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=GljTvdEDqJM</p> <p>Perhaps you could create a tri fold brochure by dividing an A4 page into 3 columns – this would allow a column for a front page/cover and columns for sections on 5 other landmarks. You may want to use headings and sub-heading to organise your information and include pictures, photos or diagrams.</p>	<p>Idioms</p> <p>In English language we have many idioms (a phrase that you might use in everyday speech but that doesn't make much sense unless you know what it means e.g. it's raining cats and dogs = it is horrible weather). Watch the Youtube video of French idioms and their English translation.</p> <p>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ujrDlscd2Vw</p> <p>Give them a try and perhaps try and use one this week in conversation. Can you list any other expressions or idioms that we use in our language? There are some interesting ones in Scots! Ask your family if they know any or if they have a favourite.</p>	<p>Lego Challenge</p> <p>Where is your home reading book set? In a house, woodlands, seaside? Can you find a really good descriptive paragraph or descriptive phrases in your book about the setting? Make a note of key words and phrases and then use your notes to recreate the setting. If you don't have Lego, you could draw a picture or make a model another way?</p> <p>Which book is this setting from?</p> 	<p>Spelling</p> <p>Choose 5 words from your home reading book this week.</p> <p>Investigate them, what do they mean.... do they have a root word?</p> <p>Root words: Phobia means a fear, claustrophobia is a fear of small spaces.</p> <p>Write what you find out in your jotter.</p>
<p>Fraction Practice</p> <p>We have been working on finding unit fractions and non-unit fractions of amounts. To find a unit fraction (1/5) you divide the amount by the denominator (which in 1/5 is 5).</p> <p>To find a non-unit fraction (2/5) you first divide the amount by the denominator, which in this case is 5, and then multiply your answer by the numerator, which in this case it 2.</p> <p>Use this information to solve the problems attached at the bottom.</p>	<p>Problem Solving</p> <p>If</p> $\heartsuit + \heartsuit + \heartsuit + \star = 63$ $\heartsuit + \star = 37$ <p>What is the value of the star?</p> <p>I will post answers on our class Facebook page at the end of the week.</p>	<p>Time Zones</p> <p>Due to their position in the world, Paris are one hour ahead of us. For example, when it is 9am in Scotland, it is 10am in France. Use this information to solve the following:</p> <p>You are getting a flight from Edinburgh to Paris. Your flight leaves at 10.35am from Edinburgh and takes 1 hour and 55 minutes. What time will you arrive in Paris in the correct time zone?</p> <p>You leave Paris at 7.18pm and your flight takes 1hour and 33 minutes. What time would you arrive back in Edinburgh in the correct time zone?</p>	<p>Euros and Cents</p> <p>The unit of currency in France is the euro, as in most other countries of the European Union. Bills/notes are in denominations of 5, 10, 20, 50, 100, 200 and 500 euros. Coins are 1, 2, 5, 10, 20 and 50 centimes, and 1 and 2 euros.</p> <p>Check Your Change - Have a go at the attached questions. €1 = 100c. Remember to prove your final answer / show your workings!</p> <p><i>I will post answers on our class fb page at the end of the week.</i></p>	<p>Be a Pro at Prodigy!</p> <p>Continue to use your Prodigy account regularly to practise a wide range of numeracy and maths skills. You can record how often and for how long you walk.</p> <p>Also on this website, 'London Marathon Events' are setting weekly fun challenges.</p>	<p>French Boules</p> <p>Boules is played outdoors on a level surface. The game is played between two players / teams. Each team has up to 3 players with 2 boules each. At the start of the game, a small ball (coche or jack) is thrown. Each player stands in a circle and tries to throw a larger ball (boule) so that it lands close to the jack. The team having their boule or boules closest to the jack at the end wins. Can you recreate a version of this classic French game or even a game of your own to help your target practise?</p>	<p>Drawing Challenge</p> <p>Draw you and 2 friends. Design a Superhero Costume, with special skills for each person.</p> <p>What is their superpower? What do they use it for?</p> <p>Does each costume have a theme?</p> <p>Who are these Superheroes?! One is Mrs Brown, one is Miss Swanson, and one is Mrs McLearn!</p> 	<p>French Food</p> <p>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=j3UW1GRMi_o</p> <p>Crepes are thin pancakes which are often enjoyed in France. If you have the ingredients you need, you can try making your own, making sure you work with an adult.</p> <p>What toppings will you choose – sweet or savoury?</p>	<p>Rainbow Challenge</p> <p>Find something outside each colour of the rainbow.</p> <p>If it is safe and eco-friendly to do so, collect your items. If not, you could take a picture?</p> 
<p>Eiffel Tower Stem Challenge</p> <p>Can you create a free standing model of the Eiffel Tower using materials of your choice? (junk modelling, lego, marshmallows and spaghetti, rolled up paper)</p>  <p>Be as creative as you like! Include Euro prices, illustrations, name and la logo. Can you include some traditional French foods on your menu? You may even want to look on Google Maps at an address for your café. Are you underneath the heights of the Eiffel Tower or perhaps shaded along the banks of the River Seine?</p>	<p>Tour de France</p> <p>The Tour de France takes place over 23 days and covers over 2,000 miles. Each year the race takes a different route, but ever since 1975 the finish has always been in Paris with a magnificent sprint down the Champs-Élysées.</p> <p>There are various categories the cyclists can win each day. If you win one of these categories, you get the privilege to wear one of the coloured jerseys.</p> <p>Research each of the jersey colours and what you win the jersey for. Can you create a poster/factfile about each of the jerseys? You may wish to include past winners and a drawing of each.</p> <p>https://www.cyclingweekly.com/news/racing/tour-de-france/tour-de-france-the-jerseys-59552</p>	<p>The Louvre Art Gallery</p> <p>The lion visited the Louvre Art Gallery. In this gallery you will find some paintings by Italian artist Guiseppe Arcimboldo. He is famous for making portraits of people using fruit, vegetables and even fish! Or you could draw or paint your own food face masterpiece?</p> 	<p>French Flag Challenge</p> <p>Find as many blue (bleu), white (blanc) and red (rouge) items as you can in your house to make a French flag. Take a picture of it from above and post it to your class or the school Facebook page.</p>
