
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

Queen of the Pirates



Almost 500 years ago a daughter was born to Owen and Margaret O'Malley. They called their new baby Grace. Grace O'Malley was to become one of the most famous women in Irish history.

The O'Malleys were a rich and powerful seafaring family. They owned many fine castles in Mayo and in other places in the west of Ireland. They also owned a fine fleet of ships. Owen O'Malley was an Irish chieftain with long hair and his daughter Grace looked very like him.

From an early age Grace wanted to go with her father and brother on their sailing trips. However, she was always told that she could not because she was a girl.

One day Grace decided that she couldn't stand being left at home any longer. She went off and cut her lovely long hair and put on some boy's clothes. She then went up to her father and said, "Now will you take me with you?" He was shocked when he saw her shaved head but

agreed to take her with him. In fact this is how Grace got the name 'Granuaile' which means 'bald Grace' in Irish.

Grace went on to become the bravest and best-known pirate on the west coast of Ireland. Her clever ideas and daring brought her riches and success. She was known for the way her ships seemed to appear out of nowhere and attack. Grace loved the exciting life of a pirate but she was also very good at business. Her fleet of ships was always laden with goods from distant lands.

At one time Grace faced a problem. A powerful man called Sir Richard Bingham was trying to stop her ships from trading. He had also put her son in prison. Grace decided to go to see the Queen of England to try to make a deal with her. Grace O'Malley, the pirate queen, met the Queen of England in September 1593. Between the two of them they sorted out the problem and Grace got what she wanted.



The Salty Sea

Have you ever swum in the sea? Have you ever swallowed a mouthful of sea water? What did it taste like? Yes, it tasted salty. Read on and find out why.



Rivers have been pouring their water into the sea for millions of years. But the river has a long journey to make before it gets to the sea. On its way to the sea the river passes through a lot of land. As it does so it picks up rocks and soil. The rocks and soil contain things called minerals. One of these minerals is salt.

It has taken millions of years for the rivers to drop enough salt in the sea to make it salty. This is why river water does not taste salty. Lake water does not taste salty either because as soon as one river brings some salt to the lake another river carries it out again!

We cannot drink sea water, not because it doesn't taste nice but because it would be bad for us. Because there is such a large supply of sea water in the world it would be very useful if we could find a way to take the salt out of it.

Scientists are working on this project at the moment. They have found many ways of taking the salt out of sea water. However, they need to find the cheapest way possible of doing so.









HEXAGON ADDITION WALL 3A






