<u>Phonics</u>

We are learning the **ck** sound this week. We have already learned the 'c' and 'k' sound separately, but this week we are thinking of them together, as one sound. The action is the same as the one for the individual sounds – here it is to remind you:

# Big Question: What makes Scotland unique?

## Scottish story

This week our focus is a story. It is a Scottish version of the classic tale 'There was an old lady who swallowed a fly'. It's called 'There Was a Wee Lassie Who Swallowed a Midgie'.

Once you've listened to the story discuss these questions with an adult:

- What creature did the wee lassie swallow to catch the midgie?
- How many of the other creatures that she swallowed can you remember?
- What did the wee lassie's stomach look like? Do you think that was a good way to show the inside of her body?
- What happened to the wee lassie at the end of the book? Is that what you expected to happen?

#### Writing Awesome Alliteration

When the wee lassie swallowed the trout, it "flip-flopped and swim-swam and bubbled about". When an author uses similar sounds at the beginning of words it is called <u>alliteration</u>.

What sounds do you hear at the beginning of these pairs of words?

Talk about this story with an adult:

- Why is Frog feeling sorry for himself?
- How many times does Frog complain? What does he complain about?
- How do Frog's friends try to help him?
- Can you think of any other ways to help Frog?
- Discuss how Frog's unhelpful thinking is stopping him from looking on the bright side.

• Explain to your child, that in our lives the difficult times pass and happier times follow; relate this to the story, Winter passed and Spring arrived making Frog much happier. Try to find situations in your own lives when this has happened, e.g. today you can't go to school, but the school WILL open again.

• It is important for your child to realise that even at a difficult moment, we can have positive thoughts.

## PE 1 - Midgie Movement

In 'There Was a Wee Lassie Who Swallowed a Midgie', the lassie swallows lots of different animals. Your challenge is to have a go at moving like these animals...

How does a midgie fly? Is it different to how a puffin flies? Or an eagle? Can you fly like them?

Move like a Scottie dog - crawling on your knees. Is this different to how a cow moves? Have a go!

How does a trout swim? Is it different from how Nessie would swim? Can you flip-flop and bubble about? Remember

trout and Nessie don't have any arms or legs!

How does a seal move? Have a go – remember a seal has two flippers at the front and one at the back.

How do you think the wee lassie will move once she's swallowed all these creatures? And how will she move once the loch has washed everything out of her?

## <u>Art</u>

Scotland has many native animals. Some live in the sea, some live on land. Have a look online to see what animals you can find who are native to Scotland. For this task we are going to work on our sketching skills.

I would like you to choose one Scottish animal to sketch.

- Find a picture of your chosen animal.
- Look at it closely and think about the shape of the animal and its features.
- Begin by drawing a rough outline of the shape of your animal, as large as you can.
- Then add in the detail. Think about its features – face, markings, claws etc... Think about its skin – is it covered in fur or feathers? How can you show that on your picture?
- You do not have to colour in your picture our focus is on the details, not the colour.

Tattie Scone recipe	Method
Ingredients 225g peeled potatoes	<ul> <li>Boil the potatoes in salted water until tender.</li> <li>Drain the potatoes and mash them with the butter, salt, pepper and baking powder.</li> </ul>
65g plain or all-purpose flour	<ul> <li>Mix in the flour to make a stiff dough. The exact amount of flour will depend on the type of potatoes used.</li> </ul>
25g butter Half a teaspoon of salt	<ul> <li>Roll out the dough on a floured surface to around 5 to 6 mm thickness.</li> <li>Cut into rounds, use a saucer or small tea plate as a guide.</li> </ul>
Pinch of pepper	<ul> <li>Prick all over with a fork and score the dough to mark 4 equal wedges.</li> <li>Cook in a heavy pan or griddle which has been very lightly greased.</li> </ul>
Quarter Teaspoon of baking Powder	<ul> <li>Cook each side for about three minutes on a medium heat until the scones are golden brown.</li> </ul>
